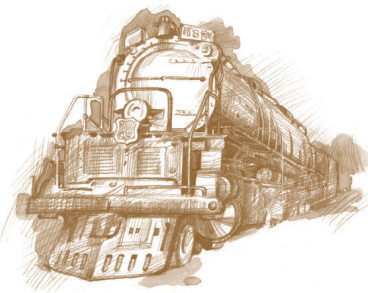

Mayor Robert J. Seader's Veterans Day Speech

November 11, 2017



Hello, and thank you all for coming out on this very cold day. I think you will agree with me that though the temperature is chilly, our hearts are warmed by the feeling of gratitude we have for our men and women of the armed forces, our veterans, and for all the police and fire and rescue and emergency service people who literally pull us out of harm's way when danger is greatest.

We are here today to honor our Veterans, those who served, and many of whom died, in service to our nation.

I like to think of America as a country supported by three pillars: values, spirituality and power.

America was founded on July 4, 1776, when our Founding Fathers declared our independence from a tyrant and fought a seven year war to assert our right to live as a free people, with liberty and justice for all. Our virtue is that 241 years later, we still believe in these values, maybe more now than ever, and this belief makes us unique among all the nations of the world.

America was founded in our abiding faith in the strength of spirituality. No matter what your

individual religion, American citizens are compelled by a yearning to be good and to be a beacon of light to the rest of the world that is based in a deep commitment to something that is higher and grander than our small selves and individual lives.

And American was founded on power. But our power is not the power of aggression. We do not use power for its own sake, or to acquire what is not rightfully ours. NO! Americans use power WITH purpose, and that purpose is to fulfill our nation's moral destiny.

Which brings me back to why we are here today. Our Veterans enable America the country to fulfill our providential goal by providing the strength, and sometimes the ultimate sacrifice, to ensure that our values and our spirituality have a chance to flourish and to be passed on down to our children and to all future generations of Americans.

Quite literally, without our Veterans, we might not be here today, and I believe sincerely that without our Veterans, our ideals, what makes America an exceptional and magnificent nation, would certainly not be here today.

So, from the bottom of my heart, I thank our Veterans and all the men and women who are today serving our nation, at home and abroad.

With Dunellen Spirit! Julia Duggan Earns Her Girl Scout Gold Award

From the moment a child enters Girl Scouts, her dream is to achieve the highest award, the Girl Scout Gold Award. Surprisingly, only about 5% of all Girl Scouts ever achieve this goal. Julia Duggan, a lifelong resident of Dunellen and an active community volunteer, is proud to have recently achieved the Girl Scout Gold Award honor. How did she achieve this award? She designed an elaborate project to support the variety of talented bands that are in Dunellen High School. Because of her love of music and ability to play several instruments she wanted other students to know what musical options they have.

Julia noticed that even though the high school has three distinct and talented bands (concert, jazz and pep), the difference is unclear to non-band

students and town residents. Many students did not realize they have several options to explore music. Julia decided to create a three-part solution to promote and support the high school bands and showcase the talent that is hidden in the high school. She started by creating a band website to alleviate the confusion between the bands and describe the many opportunities the students have. Then Julia catalogued the school-owned instruments to allow more students an opportunity to play in one of the bands, even if they did not have their own instrument. After Julia catalogued, she contacted music charities to ask for instrument donations to help increase the number of school-owned instruments in playable condition. Thanks to Julia's efforts and networking Dunellen High School received a saxophone from Hungry for Music! Finally, Julia advertised band events in advance to allow the community the opportunity to attend the concerts and experience the thrill of live music.

All in all, Julia is pleased that she was able to serve her school and community. Her project has a lasting impact and will continue even after she graduates, so future band members can have the experience of playing music. To continue her community activism, she was invited to join the newly formed Dunellen Arts and Culture Commission as the high school liaison. She is pleased that she can continue to promote the arts in her community.

A Busy Year for Dunellen's PBA

2017 was a busy year indeed for Dunellen PBA Local 146. The year began with the Annual Wine Social, which raises funds for the Policemen's Benevolent Association, while also providing a social venue to meet and greet with the residents and supporters who frequent the event each year.

In May, the members participated in the yearly New Jersey Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics which raises funds for Special Olympics - New Jersey. This is a joint venture between the Dunellen and Middlesex Borough PBA's. This event has become one of the top fundraisers in the state for the 2016-2017 of all the local PBA's.

Dunellen PBA began a new fundraising venture in 2017 with ART recycling. Clothing donation bins were placed in two locations including one at John P. Faber Elementary School. The proceeds from the bin at Faber will be donated back to the PTO and remaining proceeds will be donated to other causes such as the High School yearbook, football boosters, project graduation and little league. All of which are supported yearly by the PBA.

In October, the members co-hosted a charity car show along with the Street Dreams Car Club. The event was arranged to help raise funds for

long-time Dunellen DPW employee and volunteer Dunellen Fireman, Joe Keleman. Joe was seriously injured in an explosion at his home earlier in the year and lost most of his possessions. The event drew a large crowd and over 200 cars to help raise money to help support him.

In mid-November, the Dunellen PBA 146 had several of its members honored at the New Jersey State PBA Valor Awards. Sergeant Prescott Chin, Detective Brian O'Neill and Patrolman Brian Robbins were honored with Life Saving Awards for successfully saving a troubled veteran attempting suicide.

The PBA drew the year to a close with its newest event, a toy drive. On November 30th, a toy drive event was held at the Dunellen Cinema Café. The event featured a showing of the Holiday children's film, "The Polar Express." Children attending were encouraged to wear their pajamas (as is done in the movie) and were served hot cocoa and chocolate chip cookies (also from the movie). The cost for attendance? A new, unwrapped toy for each child attending. All proceeds from the drive went to the New Jersey State PBA toy drive for New Jersey Foster & Adoptive Family Services. This organization distributes the toys throughout the state to the kids who truly need it most. The event was a huge success courtesy of the residents of Dunellen, Middlesex and other neighboring towns who came out and shared the holiday generosity.

It was truly a busy year for the PBA and none of it could have been possible without the Officers of the Dunellen Police force, who make up the PBA membership or the residents of our borough who support them. 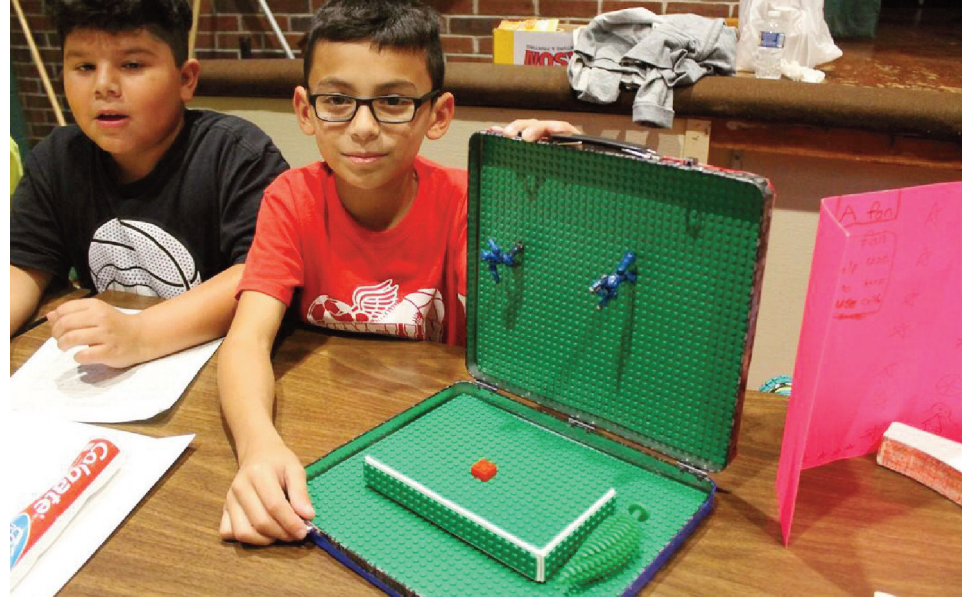


Playground Committee

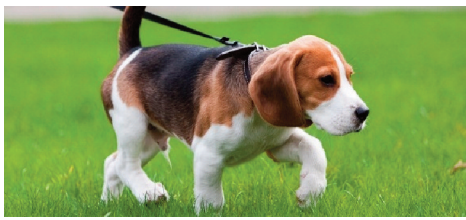

Dog and Cat Licensing



Dog licenses must be renewed during the month of January as required by the State of New Jersey and Chapter 103-04 of the Code of Dunellen. State law requires that in order to issue a license, the rabies vaccination must NOT expire prior to November 1st of the licensing year. Cat licenses must be renewed during the

month of May as required by the State of New Jersey and Chapter 103-32 of the Code of Dunellen. State law requires that in order for a license to be issued, the rabies vaccination must NOT expire prior to February 28th (February 28, 2017) of the following year.

Use Medications Safely

Bring a list with ALL your medicines when you go to your doctor's office, the pharmacy, or the hospital. Include all prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements that you use.

Establish a relationship with your pharmacist. By filling all prescriptions in one pharmacy, you have an up-to-date record of all your medications, reducing the risk of an accidental drug interaction.

Ask questions about your medicines. Make sure you understand the answers about how to take a medicine and if there are any side effects that you may experience. Take notes or bring a relative or friend with you to ask questions and remind you about the answers later.

Make sure your medicine is what the doctor ordered. Open the bag and check the medicine before you leave the pharmacy. Does a refill look like it is a different shape, color, or size than what you were given before? If something seems wrong, ask the pharmacist to double-check it. Most errors are first found by patients.

Take medication safely.

- Take the correct dose. Use a dosing spoon, oral dropper or syringe for measuring medicine. Depending on the style, a common kitchen teaspoon can hold as little as half a dose, or as much as twice the needed dosage. Inaccurate dosing can cause serious problems, especially for children.
- Never use someone else's prescription medication for a self-diagnosed illness. Antibiotic re-

sistance is a serious public health problem, so make sure you finish all your own prescriptions.

- Discard all medications that are past their expiration date. Put them in the garbage – do not flush them down the toilet.
